Facts About Dental Assistants & Job Opportunities

According to the California Employment Development Department, the need for Dental Assistants from 2006–2016 will increase by 34.9 percent with an annual average of 2,170 job openings per year.

To become a Registered Dental Assistant in the State of California you must be a high school graduate and pass a State written examination and practical examination. To be eligible to take the exam you must complete a Board approved Dental Assistant Program, a minimum of 720 hours; or you must complete 1,560 hours paid work experience as Dental Assistant with a licensed Dentist in the United States; or complete a Department of Education approved 4-month education program and 11 months of work experience with a licensed Dentist in the U.S. (www.dbc.ca.gov.)

Fingerprinting and clearance by the Department of Justice and the FBI is required before a license is issued.



What Does a Dental Assistant Do?

Dental Assistants work along with Dentists and Dental hygienists and perform a variety of office, patient care, and laboratory tasks. Dental Assistants prepare patients for treatment and examinations and assure that dental records, supplies, and instruments are ready for the dentists to use. Assistants help the dentist at chair-side by handing instruments and materials to the dentists and keeping patients comfortable and relaxed. They also prepare patients for x-rays, take x-rays, process

films, sterilize and disinfect

instruments and equipment, take impressions, and instruct patients in post-treatment care. (http://www.calmis.ca.gov/file/ occmisc/HealthCareCareers.pdf)

How Much Can I Earn?

The earnings of Dental Assistants vary according to their education, skill level, years of experience and geographic location.

Salaries vary widely throughout California. In 2009, according to the EDD Labor Market Information Division, the median (midpoint) hourly wage was \$15.82 in California with a median annual salary of \$32,908. In the Bay Area, median salaries ranged from \$42,340 in the East Bay Area to \$37,503 in the San Francisco Bay Area. In Sonoma County the median salary was \$48,088 while in Kern County the median salary was \$25,389. Salaries are notably lower in other states in the U.S.
